I would also like to express my personal gratitude to our articles editor, Edward Mushett Cole, who has made running *Rosetta* a far less arduous task than it could otherwise have been.

All that remains is to thank, once again, all those who have been involved in *Rosetta* during my term as General Editor. I hope you have enjoyed, and will continue to enjoy, the fruits of their labour.
